Transphorm GaN offers improved efficiency over silicon, through lower gate charge, lower crossover loss, and smaller reverse recovery charge.




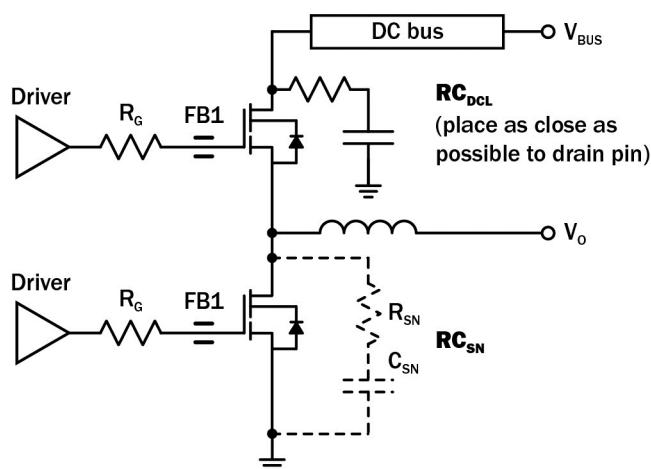






Figure 1. Typical Output Characteristics $T_J=25^\circ C$

Parameter: V_{GS}




Figure 2. Typical Output Characteristics $T_J=175^\circ C$

Parameter: V_{GS}




Figure 3. Typical Transfer Characteristics

$V_{DS}=10V$, parameter: T_J




Figure 4. Normalized On-resistance




Figure 5. Typical Capacitance

$V_{GS}=0\text{V}$, $f=1\text{MHz}$




Figure 6. Typical C_{ooss} Stored Energy




Figure 7. Typical Q_{ooss}




Figure 8. Typical Gate Charge




Figure 9. Forward Characteristics of Rev. Diode
 $I_S=f(V_{SD})$, Parameter T_J




Figure 10. Current Derating
Pulse width $\leq 100\mu\text{s}$




Figure 11. Safe Operating Area $T_c=25^\circ\text{C}$
(calculated based on thermal limit)




Figure 12. Safe Operating Area $T_c=80^\circ\text{C}$




Figure 13. Transient Thermal Resistance




Figure 14. Power Dissipation




Figure 15. Switching Time Test Circuit

for methods to ensure clean switching)




Figure 16. Switching Time Waveform




Figure 17. Diode Characteristics Test Circuit

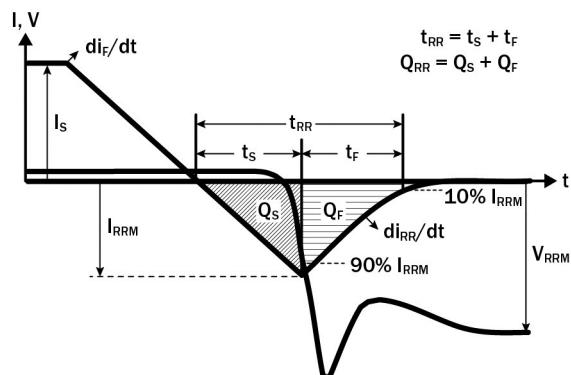


Figure 18. Diode Recovery Waveform




Figure 19. Dynamic $R_{DS(on)eff}$ Test Circuit

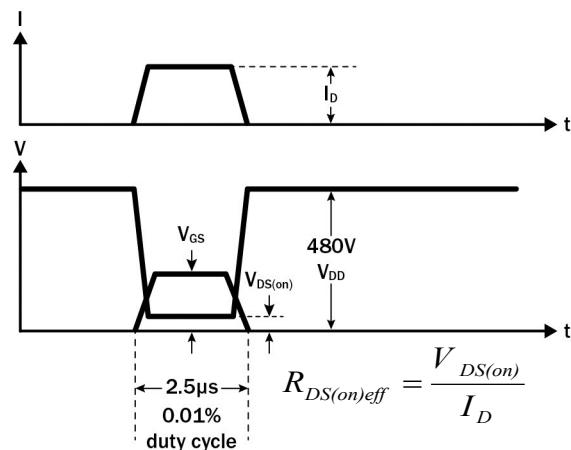


Figure 20. Dynamic $R_{DS(on)eff}$ Waveform

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Design Considerations

The fast switching of GaN devices reduces current-voltage crossover losses and enables high frequency operation while simultaneously achieving high efficiency. However, taking full advantage of the fast switching characteristics of GaN switches requires adherence to specific PCB layout guidelines and probing techniques.

Before evaluating Transphorm GaN devices, see application note [Printed Circuit Board Layout and Probing for GaN Power Switches](#). The table below provides some practical rules that should be followed during the evaluation.

When Evaluating Transphorm GaN Devices:

DO	DO NOT
Minimize circuit inductance by keeping traces short, both in the drive and power loop	Twist the pins of TO-220 or TO-247 to accommodate GDS board layout
Minimize lead length of TO-220 and TO-247 package when mounting to the PCB	Use long traces in drive circuit, long lead length of the devices
Use shortest sense loop for probing; attach the probe and its ground connection directly to the test points	Use differential mode probe or probe ground clip with long wire


