


Fig 1. Typical On-Resistance vs. Gate Voltage




Fig 2. Maximum Drain Current vs. Case Temperature




Fig 9. Typical Source-Drain Diode Forward Voltage




Fig 10. Maximum Safe Operating Area




Fig 11. Drain-to-Source Breakdown Voltage




Fig 12. Typical C_{oss} Stored Energy




Fig 13. Typical On-Resistance vs. Drain Current




Fig 14. Maximum Effective Transient Thermal Impedance, Junction-to-Case




Fig 15. Avalanche Current vs. Pulse Width









Fig 16. Maximum Avalanche Energy vs. Temperature

Notes on Repetitive Avalanche Curves , Figures 15, 16: (For further info, see AN-1005 at www.irf.com)

1. Avalanche failures assumption:
Purely a thermal phenomenon and failure occurs at a temperature far in excess of T_{jmax} . This is validated for every part type.
 2. Safe operation in Avalanche is allowed as long as T_{jmax} is not exceeded.
 3. Equation below based on circuit and waveforms shown in Figures 23a, 23b.
 4. $P_{D(ave)}$ = Average power dissipation per single avalanche pulse.




Fig 22. Peak Diode Recovery dv/dt Test Circuit for N-Channel HEXFET® Power MOSFETs




Fig 23a. Unclamped Inductive Test Circuit




Fig 23b. Unclamped Inductive Waveforms




Fig 24a. Switching Time Test Circuit




Fig 24b. Switching Time Waveforms




Fig 25a. Gate Charge Test Circuit

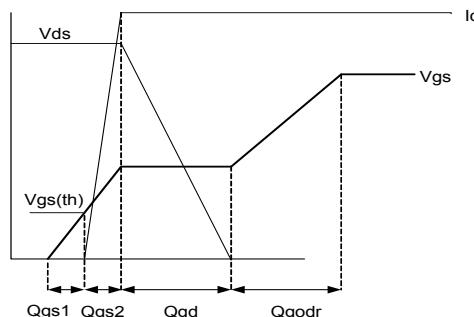



Fig 25b. Gate Charge Waveform


